He talked Carol through all of the items and add-on parts available to create a chair unique to her measurements. Carol had a trial of the chair and loved it, so decided to get a chair tailored to her and chose to have it made in red leather.

After the measurements were carried out, the details were sent to the workshop. Carol was excited throughout the process and was keen for her chair to be delivered so she could try it out.

Carol has now received her comfy chair and is very pleased with it as it fits her perfectly. She enjoys sitting in her seat to watch her favourite films, and is regularly laughing with her support staff about how the chair resembles a royal throne!





World Autism Acceptance Week

World Autism Acceptance Week is a global campaign which takes place every year during the last week of March.

The campaign aims to help more people understand what autism is, as well as the ways it can affect life for people with autism. Each year has a different theme, and this year the theme was 'colour'.

To mark the week, our Student Support service hosted a stall in Dundee and Angus College's Gardyne Campus to raise awareness around autism. The colourful stall contained leaflets about the support the service offers, an autism 'true or false' quiz, written quotes from students about how their autism affects them, as well as information around the service's National Autistic Society (NAS) Autism Accreditation.

A showcase event was held in the V&A Dundee to further raise awareness of autism. Over 50 people attended including Hillcrest's Chief Executive Angela Linton, Director of Corporate Services Lesley Don, staff from across Hillcrest Futures, the people they support, as well as their families.

The event consisted of a variety of stalls and activities that celebrated the work from a range of our services including Student Support, Alexander Street, Birkdale, River Street and Riverview.

Meanwhile, people supported by our Millview, Pitkerro, Canning Place and Rockwell Place services got together with staff and their families to walk for World Autism Acceptance Week.

They walked from Magdalen Green to the V&A in Dundee to help raise awareness for autism. Some of the group painted their faces, wore bright colours, and decorated their wheelchairs and walkers to celebrate everybody's uniqueness.





Supporting people to achieve their goals

Staff from our Alexander Street service in Dundee have been working with the people they support to help them gain more independence and achieve their personal goals.

This includes supporting Daniel with his goals of eating healthier. Alongside his keyworker Mitchell, Daniel made a lasagne from scratch, and made use of his new air fryer to make some garlic bread. Daniel said the meal was "banging" and was glad he had leftovers to freeze for another time.

Meanwhile, Rebekah has been supported by staff to take on additional leadership duties at the service. She enjoys recycling within her own flat, so decided to start helping out with the recycling for the whole building. She has particularly enjoyed collecting used tea bags and toilet roll tubes to add to the compost bin in the service's shared garden.

Aaron was very keen to follow in the steps of his neighbours to gain more independence by travelling to his local shop. Aaron worked with keyworker Mitchell to plan and create a staged outcome plan for this. Aaron was supported to go to the shop to take photos of his journey to create a visual plan on his whiteboard. Aaron has excelled with this and has been keeping all of his neighbours and staff updated on how he is progressing.

Rebekah, who is supported by our Alexander Street service in Dundee, has recently been having a range of music lessons including keyboard, trombone and singing.

A few months ago, Rebekah played her trombone at a concert in the Hillbank Church. She really enjoyed this and wants to keep practising for the next concert. She commented:

"Music really lifts my mood and is a great help for my mental health."





Hillcrest Futures moves award-winning services to new location

We have relocated vital services to our newly redeveloped South Ward Road building from our former Cairn Centre premises in Dundee.

The new facility will provide a range of services to support people with their wellbeing, including harm reduction and recovery services for people whose lives are affected by substance use.

Our award-winning Harm Reduction service is run in partnership with NHS Tayside and offers integrated care and support to people to help reduce drug-related deaths and blood-borne viruses. The Peer Naloxone project has helped to provide overdose prevention training to people in the community and distributed hundreds of life-saving naloxone kits.

The Harm Reduction service's role in the 'Eradicating Hep C' research contributed to effectively eradicating Hepatitis C in people who inject drugs in Tayside, a world-first achievement that has helped offer better treatment and support to people with Hepatitis C.

Angela Linton, Hillcrest chief executive, added: "We took the decision to redevelop our South Ward Road building as it was no longer fit for purpose and have relocated our award-winning

services that were previously sited in the Cairn Centre. The newly renovated and modernised building will provide the ideal work environment for Hillcrest Futures to continue supporting vulnerable people, their families and carers through one-to-one and group sessions.

"In addition, a wellbeing café will run weekly - supported by peer volunteers - offering the opportunity for people to come along, get something to eat and socialise with others. The centre will offer a place for people in recovery to give something back to help others who may also be struggling."

Tania, Shauna and Rebekah enjoyed lunch together before heading to the zoo where they met Carol and Michael. Everyone had a great time seeing the animals and learning more about them.

We have also recruited a Retail Volunteer Coordinator, Sergio Soave, to help develop our volunteering opportunities within our retail fundraising activities. Sergio has volunteered in Past Present Futures for the past two and a half years and is delighted with his new role. He looks forward to new and exciting projects to come.






Local jewellery designer works with Hillcrest Futures to help people on their path to recovery

Community mosaic showcases Dundee's past, present and future

A Dundee-based community group has collaborated with a local artist to help people develop their skills and connect with others through art.

Dundee Futures Project, run by Hillcrest Futures, works with people who would like to increase their confidence, meet new people, learn skills and improve their physical and mental wellbeing. They do this by offering one-to-one support and delivering activities such as cooking, art and walking groups.

Over the past few months, a few members of the Project have worked closely with community artist Pamie Bennett to create a colourful piece of artwork to represent their hometown of Dundee.

Niamh Kelly, Dundee Futures Project Worker explains:

"Last year, we began an art project designed to be challenging and engaging, with an end product that we could be proud of. When we first met, we sat with a large piece of blank paper in front of us and started the process of deciding what we could do. After lots of discussions and sketching out ideas, we chose to make a paper mosaic of the Dundee skyline to represent the city's past, present and future.

"We collected magazines, photographs, various textures and colours, then layered the pieces to make shapes and arranged them into something new. We chose landmark buildings, features and icons that symbolise Dundee and we individually worked on these sections.

"We wanted the mosaic to reflect the changes Dundee has undergone and continues to undergo. We divided the piece into three sections, past, present and future, and chose a colour palette that described the environmental and social experiences of each time period, moving from sepias and greys reminiscent of Dundee's industrial past, overcrowded living conditions and poverty, to iridescent, neon colours of hope for a better, brighter future Dundee for us all.

"We are really proud of the finished mosaic, and would like to thank Pamie for all of her support and encouragement throughout the project. Everyone in the group showed great teamwork and it is extremely rewarding to see everyone's confidence and skills grow."

A participant of the art project commented

"Looking at the finished mosaic and how good it looks, it's hard to remember how I doubted myself. Being part of this project has given me skills that I can take away including confidence, the ability to speak to people and being able to function as a human being again."

Dundee Futures Project is based in Hilltown and supports anyone over the age of 16 to develop skills, meet new people and experience a range of recreational, educational and social opportunities.
