Annual Procurement Report April 2024 – March 2025

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1. Introduction

Under the Procurement Reform (Scotland) Act 2014 (the Act), public bodies with an annual regulated procurement value of more than £5 million are required to produce an Annual Procurement Report reviewing performance activity against the objectives and commitments set down within their Procurement Strategy.

In accordance with these statutory obligations, the Association has prepared this Annual Procurement Report, which provides a summary of all regulated procurement activity carried out during the reporting period from 1 April 2024 to 31 March 2025.

For the purposes of this report, regulated procurements refer to public contracts with an estimated value of:

- Over £2,000,000 for works contracts, or
- Over £50,000 for contracts relating to goods and/or services

2. Summary of Regulated Procurements Completed

The Association completed one regulated procurement exercises during the reporting period. This activity is summarised in Table 2A below.

All regulated procurement was conducted in accordance with the Association's approved Procurement Policy, ensuring compliance with legal requirements, best practice, and value-for-money principles.
