The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 December 2020.

Legal and administrative information set out on the previous page forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements; the Articles of Association; Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (Charities SORP (FRS 102) (second edition - October 2019) and the Companies Act 2006.

OBJECTIVE AND ACTIVITIES - THE ROLE OF THE ARCHIE FOUNDATION

The ARCHIE Foundation operates on a non-profit basis. Our mission is to make the difference in healthcare and bereavement for local babies, children and their families. We do this by working in partnership with the NHS in Grampian, Highlands, Orkney, Shetland and Tayside and with other child development and childcare professionals including, but not limited to, those working in the education and social work sector.

Our charitable purpose is to relieve suffering and distress and to aid the furtherance of health for local babies and children. We do this by: supporting, equipping, enhancing and maintaining neonatal and paediatric health services; providing specialist training for health professionals working in neonatal and/or child healthcare; providing practical support and resources for children, young people and their families who use child health services; providing bereavement support for children and their families; training professionals working with children to equip them with the skills and knowledge to support a bereaved child or young person; any such other related charitable objects as the Company in its sole discretion may determine. Whether in one of the major hospitals or one of the many rural community hospitals across the regions we support, The ARCHIE Foundation provides the extras, over and above core, state-funded health provision, that make the experience of being in hospital for children less daunting, less stressful, more enjoyable, often shorter and nearly always more positive.

Whether ARCHIE makes the difference by providing enhanced healthcare facilities; funding advanced training for NHS staff, funding emergency grants, equipment and/or specialist people; providing emotional support for bereaved children and their families; providing toys and/or entertainment; or any other of the myriad ways we make the difference, our work positively influences and sometimes saves the lives of children. We are extremely proud of the impact we make and enormously grateful to everyone involved in making it happen. We are a charity with babies, children, families and local people at our very core and our relationship with the NHS, education and childcare sectors is fundamental to our current and future success.



ACHIEVEMENTS & PERFORMANCE

2020 was a tremendously difficult year for all charities and especially so for those, like The ARCHIE Foundation, with a heavy focus on event-based fundraising. All of our planned fundraising events for 2020 were either cancelled or postponed, the first being the ARCHIE Spring Ball which had to be cancelled at just one day's notice on 12th March 2020, with a steady stream of postponements and cancellations through the course of the year. In the week immediately following this and prior to the national lockdown imposed on 23rd March 2020, we implemented a work-from-home policy for all staff. We utilised the Government's Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme, with all but 3 members of our team placed on furlough or flexi-furlough from April onwards. We also had to take some very difficult decisions with regard to staffing levels, with five redundancies made in June 2020. Additionally, in March, we completed a thorough cost review across the entire organisation ensuring that only business critical costs would be incurred for the remainder of the year.

Our fundraising focus switched to online campaigns, with success achieved through virtual quizzes, Oor Wullie's Garden Trail, The ARCHIE Golf Open, ARCHIE & Neo's Virtual Afternoon Tea and ARCHIE's Tree-mendous Christmas Tree Auction among the highlights.

In addition to engaging in these and other ARCHIE-led campaigns our supporters undertook their own fundraising challenges, some individually and some in sports or work teams. The charity also benefitted from significant grant funding. Collectively over the course of the year ARCHIE supporters generated a total income of over £1,194,000. This sum was significantly down versus the previous year, however it must be noted that 2019 itself was an exceptional year of fundraising thanks in the main to Oor Wullie's Big Bucket Trail. 2020 was by all accounts an extraordinarily challenging year and to have successfully raised the necessary funds to fully deliver all key aspects of our support is no small achievement. We are incredibly grateful to everyone who supported The ARCHIE Foundation in 2020 enabling us to make the difference for close to 200,000 children across the north of Scotland.

Arguably the most important part of ARCHIE's programme of support in 2020 was the provision of emergency grant funding to help financially struggling families to access the healthcare treatment and resources their child requires. The NHS provides world-class treatment and care, free at the point of delivery, but the onus is on the patient to travel to receive this. Basic equipment and resources are provided free by the NHS but often specialist equipment that will truly make the difference to the quality of life for a child is not included in NHS provision.

Over 30% of children in the UK in 2019-20 were living in poverty. 75% of children living in poverty live in a household where at least one person works (Source: Department for Work & Pensions 2021). Only families in receipt of welfare support are entitled to claim travel expenses from the NHS and even then, the NHS funds only car or public transport costs (and not everyone drives or lives on a bus route). The thousands of families who are "just making ends meet" must simply weather the unforeseen costs of travel and other expenses incurred to access emergency and/or ongoing healthcare treatment. This leaves many anxious parents making impossible choices, such as whether to put food on the table or petrol in the car. All too often our NHS colleagues find themselves rightly recommending a piece of specialist, medical equipment which will truly make the difference for a young patient only to find it cannot be funded by the NHS. In this case the family is expected to foot the bill, something which is not possible for everyone. Our aim through provision of emergency grant funding is to achieve parity in access to healthcare for young patients across North Scotland.

Despite the extremely challenging financial situation for the charity in 2020 we successfully extended our Emergency Grant Funding into Tayside, the last of the three ARCHIE regions to benefit from this important programme of support. Furthermore, thanks to the generosity of our supporters and donors we were able to fulfil all eligible applications received for emergency grant support.

In addition to extending and delivering Emergency Grant Funding we developed the ARCHIE Toy Service in Grampian and Highlands to meet new needs presented by the COVID-19 pandemic. Play Teams in both Grampian and Highlands required significantly more toys to enable them to reduce multiple handling of resources. We also opened the service up to Allied Health Professional teams working in the community who use toys as resources to carry out clinical assessments. Ordinarily AHPs have a box of resources which would be used by all children assessed in clinic. To avoid multi-handling and the need for onerous cleaning regimes ARCHIE provided a steady supply of toys such that AHPs could present each child with their own toy to use during assessment and take home afterwards to enjoy for days, weeks and even months to come.

2020 saw the continuance of ARCHIE funding for key roles and services in Grampian at Royal Aberdeen Children's Hospital and Aberdeen Maternity Hospital's Neonatal Unit, including:

Funding the ARCHIE Play Leader, Sarah Anderson, who supports all children in RACH. Sarah describes her role as "keeping spirits up and worries down on the wards". The ARCHIE Play Leader does far more than play games with the young patients in her care, she provides tailored activities every day for each child on the ward, providing not only welcome distraction, comfort, and company for the children themselves but also, crucially, enabling tired and worried parents to take time to care for themselves, grabbing a quick coffee or a short nap, to help them stay strong for their child.

Running the ARCHIE Family Centre, providing on-site hospital accommodation for parents so they can be near to their child 24/7. ARCHIE funded the creation of this vital home-from-home when RACH was built and continues to manage the facility ongoing. In 2019 we made significant investment in upgrading the ARCHIE Family Centre and parents staying there over the last year benefitted from new en-suite facilities in every room and a convivial open plan kitchen / dining / living area. ARCHIE Family Support Worker, Lynn Fraser, has run the facility for over 11 years, providing a much-needed listening ear for anxious parents in addition to the wonderful facilities at the Centre. Lynn retired at the end of May 2021 and will be sorely missed by NHS staff at RACH, ARCHIE staff and families who use the facility. The Centre is now run by two part-time ARCHIE Support & Family Centre Coordinators, Tiffeny Rothwell and Craig Duncan, which will now see the ARCHIE Family Centre staffed Monday to Friday.

ARCHIE have funded a dedicated Clinical Pain Nurse Specialist at RACH for over a decade during which time a wealth of evidence has been gathered regarding the significant impact this role and service provides to young patients. It was agreed between NHS Grampian and the ARCHIE Board of Trustees that the charity's funding of the role will cease at the end of June 2021 at which point the NHS will take on funding responsibility for the role. The "ARCHIE Pain Nurse" has made a considerable difference to the quality of life of thousands of children over the last decade and will continue to do so going forward. This is a clear case of charitable funding enabling NHS colleagues to research and test new roles and new ways of working and to make the case for ongoing state funding wherever appropriate.

A similar case-making trial, funded by ARCHIE's Friends of the Neonatal Unit, is nearing completion at Aberdeen Maternity Hospital's Neonatal Unit. Thanks to generous funding from our supporters the charity is funding a programme of Emotional & Psychological Support for parents of neonatal babies, delivered by a fully qualified Clinical Psychologist and two Counsellors. Their support proved particularly valuable for parents at the height of the pandemic, when visiting was restricted to just one parent at a time. Neonatal Staff worked especially hard during this really difficult time to keep families fully informed about their baby's development. They used V-Create software and dedicated iPads to make digital diaries so parents could share in their babies' key moments and milestones. This software was pioneered at Aberdeen Neonatal Unit thanks to funding from our charity and in particular thanks to the generosity of our donors.

Stressful working conditions caused by COVID-19 impacted severely on NHS staff up and down the UK and we were grateful to have the ability to open up our charity-funded Emotional & Psychological Support to staff and NHS colleagues, which was greatly welcomed and most especially so by staff at the Neonatal Unit itself. In addition to providing emotional support, we were thankful to be able to offer ad hoc pick-me-up treats for staff through the course of the year, a small but important part of wider community efforts to recognise and thank our NHS colleagues for their hard work in extremely challenging circumstances.

ARCHIE's Grampian Child Bereavement Network continued to work throughout the pandemic and right across the region, providing vital support to children who have lost a loved one. We very quickly moved our entire service online and provided specialist training for over 200 professionals working with children including those from the education and social work sector. Our activity days were similar taken online, proving an invaluable touchpoint and lifeline for children and families in the form of virtual treasure hunts, chocolate making workshops and even a magic show. The number of referrals we received doubled in 2020 versus the previous year and over the course of the year we distributed nearly 400 specialist bereavement books.

This year we secured funding from BBC Children In Need which enabled us to extend our Child Bereavement service further and in October 2020 we recruited two new Bereavement Support Workers who are based at RACH. They work across all NHS hospitals in the Grampian area, providing immediate support for children when a loved one dies in hospital. The immediacy of this kind of on-site support is priceless for families, providing guidance and reassurance regarding how and when to tell children about the death of a loved one and helping parents and carers to find the right words to explain this to their chid. This kind of early support ensures healthy communication within the family from the outset which helps both in reducing parental anxiety and in ensuring children receive age and stage appropriate support.

In addition to the above on-going elements of ARCHIE's programme of support we also made good progress on projects in all three regions:

Successful completion of ARCHIE's £2 million capital appeal to help build a new Children's Theatre Suite at Tayside Children's Hospital, Ninewells is another key milestone in the charity's development and despite all of 2020's challenges, building work on this incredible new facility continued at great pace. This project has been a very long time in the making, with communication between ARCHIE and NHS Tayside dating back as far as 2011. Our fundraising appeal was officially launched in 2014 and was wholeheartedly supported by the people of Tayside. From organising their own creative fundraisers, abseiling, running, baking, supporting not one but two Oor Wullie Bucket Trails and even growing "beards for bairns" their commitment in raising the funds to support this much needed facility has been incredible and we truly could not be more grateful.

All being well building work will be complete by the end of 2021, when the facility will be handed over to the NHS for commissioning works ready for official opening early 2022. The new theatre suite will double the current operating capacity meaning the vast majority of children requiring surgery at Ninewells will be treated in a child friendly and age-appropriate environment. This amazing purpose-built space has been designed with the child in mind from day one, and thanks to ARCHIE's financial contribution will transform what could otherwise have been a stark and clinical hospital environment into a bright and inspiring place for families, significantly reducing fear and anxiety for young patients at an already difficult time.

Our projects work in Grampian and Highlands sadly did not avoid the COVID effect and key projects that were underway at the time the pandemic struck were put on hold. This includes a largescale overhaul and refurbishment of the Play Zone at RACH, which sits between the medical and surgical wards providing a much-needed space for young patients to relax, play and be children. In many regards the status of the project at the time of lockdown was fortuitous - being fully boarded up while works were undertaken provided a barrier between the medical and surgical wards and an additional infection control measure to help protect staff and patients from the spread of the virus. Works commenced again early 2021 and it is hoped that government and NHS guidelines will allow the Play Zone to reopen at some point in 2021. In the interim period, the Play Team have made good use of the ARCHIE outdoor playpark which was completed in 2019 and officially opened October 2020.

In the Highlands, Stage 2 of ARCHIE's Fresh Air Project had to be placed on hold due to contractors not being permitted to continue work on site during the pandemic. It is hoped that the project will complete in 2021 to fully deliver on the aims and objectives set out by ARCHIE and our partner NHS Highlands to further enhance and improve facilities at Highland Children's Unit.

One other highly significant capital appeal project for ARCHIE is our commitment to raise £2 million for the new The Baird Family Hospital. Build work remained on hold throughout 2020 while the project was re-costed and re-presented to the Scottish Government. Approval was secured in September 2020 with building work commencing January 2021.

Around 4,500 babies are born at AMH every year; on average 1 in 7 need specialist neonatal care. The Baird, which is scheduled for completion late 2023, will replace the ageing Aberdeen Maternity Hospital (AMH) and Neonatal Unit. At 26,000m² over 5 floors it will provide a great deal more besides.

The Scottish Government is making significant investment to create this state-of-the-art new family hospital (£233m split between the twin projects of the Baird Family Hospital and the new ANCHOR Centre) with the aim that it will be a centre for excellence in Scottish neonatology, caring for and saving the lives of some of Scotland's sickest babies. NHS Grampian have engaged ARCHIE to raise a further £2 million to fund the vital finishing touches and extra specialist equipment needed to deliver more than simply a clinically excellent facility. Through partnership we will transform The Baird into a world-class facility. Our charity raised £1m towards Aberdeen Neonatal Unit in 1988 and through ongoing funding of vital "extras" not available on the NHS we helped it to become one of Scotland's most successful Neo Units. The £2m we aim to raise now will be invested in the following areas to deliver the difference at The Baird:

- Environment lighting, furnishing, decoration to achieve a welcoming and non-clinical feel £1,200,000.
- Artwork investment in bespoke, commissioned art to create a healing environment £300,000.
- Equipment funding specialist, life-saving equipment beyond that which is NHS-funded £500,000.

The ARCHIE Foundation is a much-loved and vital local charity that delivers so much for so many people. The charity is entirely funded by voluntary local contributions and we are incredibly grateful to each and every one of our donors, volunteers, trustees and dedicated staff members across Grampian, Highland, Tayside and further afield. Everything we do and achieve is thanks to their tireless support and it really does mean so much to so very many people.

ARCHIE VENTURES LTD IN 2020

The ARCHIE Foundation launched a subsidiary company, Community Cafes Ltd, in 2013 which changed its trading name to ARCHIE Ventures Ltd in 2018 to incorporate the development of additional income streams. ARCHIE Ventures Ltd is a wholly owned company of The ARCHIE Foundation.

The ARCHIE café in the Eastgate Shopping Centre in Inverness ceased trading in February 2020 when the lease was handed over to the Highland Hospice charity.

Oor Wullie's Big Bucket Trail (a highly successful fundraising trail run in partnership with Edinburgh Children's Hospital Charity and Glasgow Children's Hospital Charity in 2019) formed a major part of ARCHIE Ventures recent trading activities and the intention is for all future trading projects to be operated under this limited company. There were no ARCHIE Venture trading projects in operation through the course of 2020 and the company lies dormant while we assess future opportunities.



THE IMPACT OF ARCHIE'S SUPPORT

Selecting highlights to demonstrate the difference ARCHIE makes to the people we support is always incredibly difficult. Every story is unique and ideally we would like to share details about every child and NHS colleague who has benefitted from ARCHIE's support throughout the course of 2020. That is, however, clearly not possible for a number of reasons. What we can do is share the story of one family whose connection with ARCHIE began as 2019 moved over into 2020 and continues as they take each day, one at a time, enduring more than most of us would even wish to contemplate:

Harris was blue-lighted from Highland Children's Unit (Raigmore) to Royal Aberdeen Children's Hospital (RACH) arriving just before midnight on 31st December 2019. This marked the start point of over a year away from the family home in Skye while Harris received treatment for a cancerous tumour called a neuroblastoma. His parents spent most of 2020 living in the ARCHIE Family Centre at RACH, so they could be by his side. They celebrated Harris's 6th birthday in RACH. The following year, still here and still squaring up to each new day and whatever challenge or set back it might bring, they celebrated his 7th birthday.

ARCHIE's emergency financial grants helped see the family through the toughest times, and in over a year of living off savings and rainy-day funds there have understandably been a few. ARCHIE Play Leader, Sarah, has been here every day, helping to keep spirits up and worries down for all three. ARCHIE Pain Nurse, Emily, has helped ease the pain Harris suffered through the toughest days of his treatment.

The family are incredibly grateful for the difference ARCHIE's support has made through the toughest days of their lives, commenting that "Everyone is doing their utmost to get a normal life for us. The support is amazing."

In addition, we are pleased to share feedback received this year from Hazel Whyte, Unit Operational Manager for RACH, who shares sentiments echoed by the NHS teams we work in partnership with across Grampian, Highlands and Tayside:

"As Unit Operational Manager of Royal Aberdeen Children's Hospital, I am very fortunate to have The ARCHIE Foundation on board, as our official charity partner, dedicated to enhancing and transforming our paediatric healthcare environment, whilst assisting our NHS team to relieve and reduce the suffering and distress that children experience when visiting hospital.

I am aware of the drastic reduction in fundraising activities during this coronavirus pandemic, yet ARCHIE continues to support children and families through their crucial emergency grants programme for families in urgent financial need, supporting our specialist equipment needs, the very important Children's Play Service, the Family Accommodation Centre and also funding of specialist NHS staff within the children's hospital.

Even although elective activity reduced due to the pandemic, we continue to rely on ARCHIE support in order to maintain high quality services to children who require access to emergency and urgent care. In my opinion The ARCHIE Foundation is a crucial and essential partner."

NHS Tayside have also commended the support that they have received from The ARCHIE Foundation and acknowledge the benefits they receive through the partnership with the charity. Lorna Wiggin, Chief Officer, NHS Tayside said:

"NHS Tayside is extremely grateful for the enormous support provided by the ARCHIE Foundation which has supported us to create a 21st century new Children's Theatre Suite. The £2million contribution from the Archie Foundation has allowed us to provide additional features in the facility, which would not have been possible without the successful partnership between our two organisations. These have included the appointment of a local artist to provide bespoke artwork, the installation of sky panels in the ceilings throughout the facility, and a number of pieces of specialist equipment.

The Children's Theatre Suite will be completed towards the end of 2021, and we are really excited about building on the relationship with the ARCHIE Foundation to identify the next project and to establish how best to support children, young people and families throughout Tayside".



THE IMPACT OF ARCHIE'S SUPPORT (continued)

Footfall across all NHS sites was dramatically reduced, principally due to strict restrictions around visiting. The number of elective procedures was reduced in 2020 versus 2019 as some routine or non-urgent cases were postponed. Despite the barriers and limitations posed by the pandemic The ARCHIE Foundation continued to make an exceptional difference for local children, and NHS staff across the north of Scotland, and thanks to the generosity of our donors through an extremely challenging period, we continue to do so to this day. We are proud of the positive impact the charity has, proud of the efficiency with which it is delivered and we would be very proud to share further information about our work with existing and prospective donors.

STRUCTURE AND GOVERNANCE

The ARCHIE Foundation was formed in September 2000 to support the creation of Royal Aberdeen Children's Hospital. After the hospital opened, the charity was subsumed into the NHS Grampian Endowment Fund between 2004 and 2008, later emerging as an independent charity in 2008. The assets and liabilities of the charity were transferred into a company limited by guarantee at that time.

The Articles of Association were reviewed to allow growth into the Highlands, growth into Tayside and growth into Africa (now not relevant). The Trustees are responsible for the strategy and governance of the charity and monitoring performance in line with the strategic objectives. The ARCHIE Foundation is a charity registered in Scotland number SC039521.

The Board of Trustees devolved day-to-day management of the charity to the Chief Executive, Paula Cormack who was appointed 1st January 2021 following the departure of David Wood in August 2020.

The Board has four Committees reporting to it:

- The Clinical Advisory Committee (Grampian)
- The Finance & Governance Committee
- The Grampian Child Bereavement Network Committee
- The Friends of the Neonatal Unit Committee

The Clinical Advisory Committee, which has NHS staff members, parent representation and non-trustees as members, reviews all charitable applications over £1,000 relating to child health within the Children's Hospital and Community Child Health environments. It makes recommendations on their suitability and appropriateness to the Board.

The Friends of the Neonatal Unit Committee reviews all applications seeking support of over £500 that relate to the Aberdeen neonatal unit. The Committee has non-trustees serving on it and makes recommendations on the suitability of the applications to the Trustees. The Committee works very closely with the nursing team within the Neonatal Unit.

The Grampian Child Bereavement Network Committee has non trustees serving on it and works very closely with the Coordinator of The Grampian Child Bereavement Network. The committee meets regularly and provides direction, support, and advice. In addition, committee members provide one to one support to children and families suffering bereavement.

The Finance and Governance Committee reviews the financial performance and governance of the charity and subsidiary company and the financial implications of any funding applications being recommended for approval by the other Committees. The Finance and Governance Committee may then add further recommendations or comments for the Board relating to the financial or governance aspects of the grant being requested.



STRUCTURE AND GOVERNANCE (continued)

The Trustees consider the Chief Executive and the Director of Business Services (who together constitute the Senior Management Team) to comprise the key management personnel of the charity. Trustees are required to disclose all relevant interests and register them with the Director of Business Services at each meeting. Trustees will withdraw from decisions where a conflict of interest arises.

The Board of Trustees ultimately make decisions relating to the activity of the charity, taking into account the recommendations made to them by the Committees and Senior Management Team.

TRUSTEES

Trustees are appointed for three-year terms with an option to stand for re-election once before at least one year off the board is required. Trustees are generally invited to join the board following advertisement of the position and a subsequent interview.

Once appointed, Trustees receive an induction from the Chief Executive and senior staff members and are invited to sit on such committees as are appropriate. New Trustees are then required to enhance their knowledge through training, meetings with other members of the Board and tours of the charity's facilities, as appropriate. The Chief Executive and Senior Management Team will also spend time with the Trustees during their first year to ensure they are fully informed of the work of the charity and able to access all the information they require.

In 2020, there were 5 board meetings with the Trustees attending the number of meetings noted above (attended/eligible to attend). Dates of appointment and resignation as Trustee are noted on pages 1.

Vice Chair, Carol Munro succeeded Joe Mackie OBE as the charity's Board chair on 1st April 2021. Joe has had a long-standing relationship with the charity which dates back over 20 years to the original ARCHIE appeal which contributed £5m towards the build of RACH. We are indebted to Joe for his time, dedication and commitment as a trustee. Upon his retirement the Board of Trustees were honoured when he accepted their invitation for him to become a patron of The ARCHIE Foundation enabling him to continue his support of the charity with pride and much deserved recognition.



STRUCTURE AND GOVERNANCE (continued)

GRANT MAKING POLICY

The ARCHIE Foundation has a comprehensive funding programme providing grants for families, children and projects including those:

- for individual children currently in the care of the NHS.
- to support families during extended and/or unexpected hospital admissions.
- to support NHS child health staff to undertake advanced training courses.
- to fund specialist equipment.
- to fund specialist staff posts.

Our funding is provided to make the difference for any child, or group of children, accessing care in NHS Grampian, NHS Highland, NHS Shetland, NHS Orkney and NHS Tayside. We do not fund anything that should be provided by the NHS. What is considered as core NHS funding is increasingly open to debate.

We also provide long-term project support such as The ARCHIE Family Accommodation Suite, which includes 19 bedrooms for parents of patients in Royal Aberdeen Children's Hospital, our ARCHIE Play Leader, Specialist Nurse post, other advanced staff posts, research into illnesses affecting local children and major refurbishment or development projects within the NHS across our area of activity.

The charity makes a number of grants to individuals and groups. The Board's grant-making policy differentiates between different financial requests and requests for varying purposes depending on funds available.

Applications for support, to any part of the charity, of up to £1,000 are assessed for support by the Chief Executive or Director of Business Services. These are assessed against the charity's purposes, any current guidance from the Board and/or any existing restricted donations. Applicants are typically advised of an outcome within three working days.

Applications for support above £1,000 are assessed for approval by the appropriate expert Committee who will then make recommendations to the Board. The Board make the final decision, taking into account the recommendations - although they are not required to accept this advice.

REMUNERATION POLICY

The charity's staff remuneration is normally reviewed annually by the Chief Executive and Senior Management Team, who makes recommendations to the Finance and Governance Committee which then reports to the Board for approval. While recognising the challenges of recruitment in the North East of Scotland, the salary levels of staff are benchmarked against similar organisations within the UK to ensure that the remuneration set is fair and not significantly out of line with that generally paid for similar roles and levels of responsibility.

VOLUNTEERS

The charity enjoys the support of many highly valued volunteers who make an important and significant contribution to our work. Although most volunteer opportunities are within our fundraising activities, we do enjoy the support of some regular office-based administration volunteers as well.



2020 FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

In April 2020 we revised our budget for the remainder of the year, reducing our expectations from a targeted income of £2,623,724 with corresponding expenditure of £1,885,320 down to a targeted income of £1,134,990 with expenditure of £1,046,221.

We ended 2020 with income for the financial year of £1,194,788 (2019 - £3,394,451) and expenditure equalled £1,157,560.

While this is clearly significantly lower than our 2019 performance (when income was at £3,394,451), 2019 was in many regards an exceptional year due mainly to fundraising the Oor Wullie's Big Bucket Trail.

Total funds at 31 December 2020 totalled £1,254,306 (2019 - £1,217,078) of which £1,052,884 (2019 - £1,076,924) are restricted funds (funds received that are restricted by the donor for a specific purpose), and £201,422 (2019 - £140,154) that are unrestricted.

Of the many funds operated by the charity, shown in note 18, there was no fund showing any significant deficit. In addition, during 2020, with the exception of the COVID-19 pandemic, there were no substantial events that had a significant financial effect on the charity.

RESERVES POLICY

The Trustees have reviewed the reserves required, in response to COVID-19 impact on the charity and taking into account the current and future liabilities. The Trustees have agreed a sum of £125,000 be retained as part of the charity's reserves as provision for four months operating costs.

The free reserves of the group, after allowing for funds tied up in tangible fixed assets and designated funds, is £196,822 (2019 - £132,217).

Further reserves relate to projects not yet ready for installation or not yet fully delivered and costs for restricted purpose.

Any other reserves are only retained for the day-to-day activities of the charity and to ensure the Trustees can respond to urgent or emergency requests for assistance.

RISK

The Trustees apply a low risk strategy for the organisation in terms of financial investment and for project related expenditures. The Trustees review the Risk Register on a quarterly basis.

The Trustees maintain a position that funding should be fully available for any project before it is committed to. Where these projects span several years, reserves are created to allow subsequent years' funding to be available, this would include any capital projects not yet ready for installation or not yet fully delivered.

INVESTMENT POLICY

The Trustees opt for a low-risk investment policy with funds not immediately due for use held in short-term notice accounts up to a maximum of 1 year. Investments are made to ensure sufficient funds are always available to the charity to deliver on commitments made. The Trustees have sought confirmation from the banking partner that these funds are not invested in activities contrary to the objects of the charity.

The investment performance of £8,819 was down on the previous year (£11,079). In the current climate of low interest rates, the Board is satisfied with this return, which was in-line with expectations.



PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

Plans for the future must be made in conjunction with the current threat from the coronavirus pandemic very much in mind. It is essential that the charity fully rides out the COVID-19 storm and children and the NHS will increasingly rely on The ARCHIE Foundation for ongoing support. It is essential that the charity continues to assess the impact of the pandemic on an ongoing basis.

The charity has reorganised and restructured and has significantly reduced its cost base during 2020. The Finance and Governance committee and the senior management team meet on a regular basis to monitor income and cost and ensure that priorities are assessed and addressed.

The Senior Management Team have overseen a strategic review of the charity, a new and exciting rebranding is weeks away from launch, and a new five-year business plan is in the process of being approved.

CONNECTED BODIES

ARCHIE Ventures Limited is a wholly owned subsidiary company which in 2020 operated one cafe in Inverness which ceased trading at the end of February 2020. The cafe was designed to be run as a commercial operation with the intention of being welcoming to families and customers with young children but became financially unviable. ARCHIE Ventures Limited has a registered office address of 14 Carden Place, Aberdeen, AB10 1UR - that of our solicitors.

RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE CHARITY AND RELATED PARTIES

ARCHIE Ventures Limited was set up as a subsidiary trading company of the charity and donates its profits to the charity. Two trustees, Carol Munro (Board Chair) and David Strachan are directors of ARCHIE Ventures Limited.

GOING CONCERN

The Trustees are satisfied that the accounts should be prepared on a going concern basis. They have reviewed the level of reserves, the budget for both income and expenditure for the next 12 months and also reviewed the risks to the charity and its ability to continue to raise funds in the future.



PROVISION OF INFORMATION TO AUDITORS

Each of the persons who are trustees at the time when this Trustees' report is approved has confirmed that:

- so far as that director is aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the company and the group's auditors are unaware, and

NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - 31 DECEMBER 2020

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Company information

The ARCHIE Foundation is a private company limited by guarantee, incorporated in Scotland. The registered office is given on page 1 of these financial statements. The nature of the charity's operations and principal activities are set out within the Trustees' Report on page 2.

(b) Basis of financial statements preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

The ARCHIE Foundation meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

The Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) and Balance Sheet consolidate the financial statements of the Company and its subsidiary undertaking. The results of the subsidiary are consolidated on a line by line basis.

(c) Going concern

The trustees, having made due and careful enquiry and preparing forecasts, are of the opinion that the company has adequate working capital to execute its operations over the next 12 months. The trustees, therefore, have made an informed judgement, at the time of approving the financial statements, that there is a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. As a result, the trustees have continued to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the annual financial statements.

(d) Consolidation

These financial statements consolidate the accounts of The ARCHIE Foundation and its subsidiary undertaking, Archie Ventures Limited.

(e) Income

All income is recognised once the Company has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

For legacies, entitlement is taken as the earlier of the date on which either: the Company is aware that probate has been granted, the estate has been finalised and notification has been made by the executor(s) to the Company that a distribution will be made, or when a distribution is received from the estate. Receipt of a legacy, in whole or in part, is only considered probable when the amount can be measured reliably and the Company has been notified of the executor's intention to make a distribution. Where legacies have been notified to the Company, or the Company is aware of the granting of probate, and the criteria for income recognition have not been met, then the legacy is treated as a contingent asset and disclosed if material.



1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(e) Income (continued)

Donated services or facilities are recognised when the Company has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use of the Company of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the Company which is the amount the Company would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

Income from other trading activities includes income earned from fundraising events and trading activities to raise funds for the charity. Income is received in exchange for supplying goods and services in order to raise funds and is recognised when entitlement has occurred.

Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Income tax recoverable in relation to investment income is recognised at the time the investment income is receivable.

(f) Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Fundraising costs are those incurred in seeking voluntary contributions and do not include the costs of disseminating information in support of the charitable activities. Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the Company and include project management carried out at Headquarters. Governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the Company and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Costs of generating funds are costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, and those incurred in trading activities that raise funds.

Charitable activities and Governance costs are costs incurred on the Company's charitable activities, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the Company apportioned to charitable activities.

Grants payable are charged in the year when the offer is made except in those cases where the offer is conditional, such grants being recognised as expenditure when the conditions attaching are fulfilled. Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end are noted as a commitment, but not accrued as expenditure.

All expenditure is inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.



ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(g) Taxation

The Company is considered to pass the tests set out in Schedule 6, Part 1 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the Company is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Part 11, Chapter 3 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

(h) Government grants

Grant income is recognised once the Charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably. Where terms or conditions are attached to grants, these must be met before the income is recognised as the entitlement condition will not have been satisfied until that point. Where terms or conditions have not been met or uncertainty exists as to whether they can be met then the relevant income is deferred.

(i) Investments in subsidiaries

Investments in subsidiaries are valued at cost less provision for impairment.

(j) Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

All assets costing more than £1,000 are capitalised.

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the Consolidated statement of financial activities incorporating income and expenditure account.

Tangible fixed assets are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases:

(k) Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the Company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the Company for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.



NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - 31 DECEMBER 2020

ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(l) Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

(m) Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of twelve months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

(n) Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the Company anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised within interest payable and similar charges.

(o) Financial instruments

The Company only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

(p) Operating leases: the group as lessee

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the lease term.

(q) Pensions

The group operates a defined contribution plan for its employees. A defined contribution plan is a pension plan under which the group pays fixed contributions into a separate entity. Once the contributions have been paid, the group has no further payment obligations.

The contributions are recognised as an expense in the Statement of Financial Activities when they fall due. Amounts not paid are shown in accruals as a liability in the Balance Sheet. The assets of the plan are held separately from the group in independently administered funds.



2. JUDGMENTS IN APPLYING ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

Estimates and judgments are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical accounting estimates and assumptions:

The Company makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will seldom equal the related actual results.

Useful economic life of tangible fixed assets

The annual depreciation charge for tangible fixed assets is sensitive to changes in the useful economic lives and residual values of the assets. Useful lives and residual values are reassessed annually. They are assessed where necessary to reflect current estimates based on economic utilisation and physical condition.

Restricted funds are specifically for departments or cases and can only be used for that specified fund. The most significant funds are used for the following purposes:

Angela Monica Fund

This fund was set up for the restricted purposes of supporting children with clubfoot and/or research into clubfoot.

Baird Family Hospital Appeal

The Baird Family Hospital Appeal was launched in October 2019 to raise funds for the Neonatal and Maternity units at the new family hospital at Aberdeen Royal Infirmary.

Dr Gray's Children's Ward

This relates to fundraising for the refurbishment of the children's ward at Dr Gray's Hospital in Elgin.

Friends of the Neonatal Unit

The Friends of the Neonatal Unit fund relates for funds transferred from the Friends of the Special Nursery, a Scottish charity, upon cessation of that charity. These funds are to be used to promote the establishment, maintenance and management of a continuing support group to parents, in Grampian and environs, with babies in the Special Nursery at Aberdeen Maternity Hospital.

Royal Aberdeen Children's Hospital 10 year Appeal

This relates to donations received towards the fundraising appeal to mark ten years since the Royal Aberdeen Children's Hospital opened. The fund encompasses several sub-funds within it, which have specific objectives. Several of the pre-existing restricted donations, which fell into these objects, were amalgamated with this fund in earlier years.

Royal Aberdeen Children's Hospital Outdoor Play

This fund was set up to replace and improve the current outdoor play space at Aberdeen Royal Children's Hospital.

Tayside Appeal

The Tayside Appeal was launched in November 2014 to raise funds towards the Twin Operating Theatres in Tayside Children's Hospital. The appeal target £2m has now been accomplished and the appeal is now closed. ARCHIE will continue to have a presence in Tayside with future fundraising targeting unrestricted funds to support targeted needs within Tayside Children's Hospital and to allow the charity to expand its charitable offering, such as the introduction of emergency grant funding for families in 2021.

Highland Appeal

The Highland Appeal comprises funds raised for the development of the Highland Children's Unit in Inverness.

Highland Appeal - Fresh Air

This appeal was set up to create outdoor space and play areas at the Children's Highland Unit at Raigmore.

Grampian Child Bereavement Network

This is a restricted fund with the purpose of providing bereaved children and their families, NHS Staff and Schools with help and support when dealing with a bereavement. Support can be the provision of specialist bereavement books, dedicated volunteer visits and activity days for children and training and conferences for NHS staff, professionals from Social Work and other third sector, schools and volunteer bereavement responders.
