Beach Safety

Visiting the beach is fun. To ensure that you are safe at the beach, please follow these guidelines:



- Avoid alcohol
- Beware of changes in water depth
- Use inflatables cautiously, always have a fixed line



- Supervise your children at all times
- Be aware of the tide; be careful not to get cut off by the tide
- Be careful, even calm waters can be dangerous




- Be sun safe, stay in the shade, drink plenty of water and wear sun protection
- Do not enter the water if you feel unwell or have just eaten recently
- Be aware of others in or near the water's edge
- Keep to footpaths and be careful around the water's edge



- Be careful not to disturb the plants and animals that live at the beach
- Leave only your footprints, not your litter
- Reduce, reuse and recycle
- Please use the litter bins provided



- If you see someone in difficulty, call 999 and ask for the Coastquard
- Inform beach lifeguards / patrol (if available)

Aberdour Black Sands is a small. quiet, sandy bay. Its peaceful and tranguil surroundings make it very popular with the local community and visitors alike. The views across the Firth of Forth to Edinburgh and the Lothians make it a perfect natural retreat.







Aberdour Silver Sands is one of the most attractive resorts on the Fife Coast. The shore looks out to the islands of Inchmickery and Inchcolm, where there is a famous Abbey. With a kids' bouncy castle and lifeguards in the summer, it's a great family day out.



Burntisland Beach is located to the east of Burntisland. The natural features of the sandy beach with rock pools are enhanced by a modern leisure centre, seaside park, crazy golf course, picnic tables and an annual summer fairground.







Kinghorn Pettycur Bay is a small, sheltered, sandy bay backed by sand dunes. It is an ideal spot to stop and enjoy the breathtaking views. At low tide, a huge area of sand and mud flats is exposed which go all the way out to the Black Rocks and Burntisland Beach.



Kinghorn Harbour is an excellent destination for families, this pleasant beach is located to the East of Kinghorn overlooking the Firth of Forth, With natural features of a sandy beach, rock pools and cliffs, it is a beautiful bay offering something for everyone.

Shops and restaurants are close by and there are plenty of wet weather alternatives!
